WHAT WE HEARD

Ward 2 Temporary Leash Free Park Engagement Summary

1. Engagement Background

The Ward 2 Temporary Leash Free Park Engagement was launched in response to the closure of the Strachan Leash Free - Free Running Area in late 2021, and the delayed opening of the permanent Ward 2 Leash Free – Dog Park at Central Park (to be determined). The purpose of the engagement was to:

- Gather input on use of designated leash free parks across the city and features of designated areas that are important to leash free park users.
- Gauge interest in a temporary leash free park designation in Ward 2 at Jackie Washington Rotary Park.
- Provide an opportunity for visitors to provide comments and ask questions related to a temporary leash free designation at Jackie Washington Rotary Park.

All engagement activities were all hosted on Engage Hamilton (online engagement platform) and available from January 10, 2022 – March 1, 2022. https://engage.hamilton.ca/ward-2-temp-leash-free-park

2. Visitor Summary

2.1 Outreach Strategy

The Ward 2 Temporary Leash Free Park Engagement was promoted through:

- City of Hamilton (Engage Hamilton, social media, dog park webpage).
- Councillor Farr's Newsletter.

- Signage within the Strachan Open Space and Jackie Washington Park.

Participants mainly accessed the engagement via a link through social media (124), Direct visit to the webpage (67), and through a Search Engine such as google (15).

2.2 Levels of Engagement

Aware (393)	393 online visitors viewed the engagement project page associated with the Ward 2 Temporary Leash Free Park. These online visitors are considered "Aware".
Informed (273)	273 online visitors viewed multiple project pages and links associated with the Ward 2 Temporary Leash Free Park and Hamilton Leash Free Parks Program. The online visitors are considered "Informed".
Engaged (227)	227 online visitors completed the survey (225) and/or participated in the Question and Answer (17). These online visitors are considered "Engaged".

3. Survey Summary


- 3.1 225 online visitors completed the 9-question survey.
- 3.2 88% (199) of respondents owned a dog and 82% (164) of these respondents had dogs registered with the City of Hamilton.
- 3.3 12% (26) of respondents did not own a dog.
- 3.4 In 2021, 52% (116) of respondents visited Strachan Free Running Area to exercise a dog with varying frequency (Daily (41), weekly (39), monthly (17), less than monthly (19)). 48% (109) respondents did not visit the Strachan Free Running Area in 2021.
- 3.5 The most frequented City of Hamilton Leash Free Parks by respondents in 2021 were:
 - i) Rail Trail (76)
 - ii) Corporal Nathan Cirillo (67)
 - iii) Hill Street (63)
- 3.6 The most important leash free park features in order of preference by respondents were:



- 3.7 52% (117) of respondents do not visit Jackie Washington Rotary Park located at 363 and 371 Wellington Street North.
- 3.8 48% (108) of respondents visit Jackie Washington Rotary Park located at 363 and 371 Wellington Street North and make use of the following park features:

3.8 70% (157) of respondents are interested in a temporary leash free designation at Jackie Washington Rotary Park. 12% (27) of respondents are not interested in this feature and 18% (41) of respondents were indifferent to the idea.

 - i. Other* (further details provide in comments below including Safety and accessibility).
 - ii. Impact on quality of life.
 - iii. Noise

*Under the concern 'Other', 15 Respondents provided comments related to concerns with a Leash Free designation at Jackie Washington Rotary Park. Comments have been categorized into those pertaining to safety (15), accessibility (2) and other (1). A full list of comments and categorization can be found in Appendix A.

Safety concerns included:

- General safety (5).
- Safety due to proximity to the detention centre (1), encampments (2) and drug use in the park (2)
- Aggressive dogs attacking people and/or other dogs (6)

- Risk associated with improperly discarded needles and broken glass in the park, urine, and feces because of the off-leash area (3)

6 commenters who raised safety as a concern indicated fencing would make them feel safer, or that fencing was necessary for safety if a leash free designation was added.

Accessibility concerns were identified with respect to the portion of the park south of Simcoe Street East and included concerns with restrictions to accessibility of the park due to the stairway (1) and the slope (1) in the south side of the park.

Other comments included concern that the leash free park would not be used, and suggestions on alternative locations (Eastwood Park, Strachan Open Space between McNab and Bay).

4. Question and Answer Summary

17 questions were posted through Engage Hamilton or direct to dog.parks@hamilton.ca A summary of all questions and answers as well as categorization is in Appendix B.

- 10 questions were out of scope of this engagement and instead related to the Leash Free Parks Program Policy in general and Leash Free Parks in other Wards, or specifics of this engagement.
- 4 questions/comments were in support of the designation at Jackie Washington Rotary Park and 2 of these recommended that it be a permanent designation.
- 4 questions/comments stated that Central Park is too far from the North End Neighbourhood.
- 2 questions/comments suggested fencing of the Strachan Leash Free Free Running Area.

7	There should NOT be a leash free area without a proper fence. In the summer of 2021 a 10 year old child from the north end was attacked by a dog at the Strachan off leash park. They were bit on the face, arm and buttock. The child was riding their bicycle on the sidewalk and since there was no fence, they approached the dog. The owner of the dog thought that their dog would be friendly and instructed the child to put their hand out to greet the dog. However, the owner was wrong and the dog attacked. Furthermore, the owner failed to remain at the scene even after the child was visibly hurt. As the owner could not be found to confirm that the dog had all its shots in order, the child contacted had to receive a round of rabies vaccines. This behaviour is not common, and I do acknowledge that. However, this incident could have been prevented if the off leash park had a proper fence. Please do not create another one of these in the neighbourhood unless you are able to have proper fencing.	Safety - Aggressive dogs attacking people and/or other dogs; Fencing for safety

The City of Hamilton is looking to establish a temporary leash free designation in the North End Neighbourhood in Ward 2 through the Leash Free Parks Program. 12	Hi. In regards to Jackie Washington, yes there's ample space for a dog area. I don't own a dog but I understand that providing these socialization areas in every park that's large enough is important for neighbourhood safety as it results in better behaved dogs and lower chance of dogs being off leash in general park areas. Providing more dog areas also means fewer people driving to dog parks. The reason parking becomes a problem is because we haven't provided dog areas within walking distance of people's houses. The dog park at Jackie Washington should be permanent not temporary. More issues with Jackie Washington: 1. No accessible route from Simcoe. There is ample room on the northwest slope to provide a switchback path to access Simcoe from the upper courtyard area. The stairs are impassable by mobility devices and bikes, and in winter they are not maintained (why?). Can this be prioritized? 2. There is no playground equipment at all. Why? Based on the state of the exercise gear, perhaps that area should be given back to kids. More generally, there's seems to be an absolute disconnect in the Parks department from the realities of park usage. A huge function of parks is to act as active transportation corridors to link streets in neighbourhoods and yet there are no parks that honour these connections with curb cuts and internal pathways. Accessibility is atrocious due to lack of curb cuts where park paths meet streets, and in almost every park in the city, the desired user pathways are	Hello, Thank you for your comments and feedback pertaining to the proposed temporary Leash Free Area in question as well as Parks and Trails in general. Here is some feedback in response to the specific questions asked: 1) Currently accessible access to Jackie Washington Park is from Wellington St. North. Further to your comment, one side of the stairway is prioritized to be shoveled as part of the City's regular snow maintenance schedule. Should you notice that snow clearing has not been completed, I encourage you to contact Customer Service at 905-546-City, and a complaint will be lodged. 2) Generally, municipal parks go through a public consultation process when they are created and when major updates are being conducted to determine the desired types of uses (you can view and participate in some of these current engagement processes on Engage Hamilton today).
