SETBACKS

basketball nets are not close to residences

I don't like the basketball court/ball hockey pad. It affects us directly because we live so close.

I do not want any basketball court at all. Too noisy and brings people from outside the neighborhood. This is a quiet neighborhood.

In concept 1 the basketball court is further away from East 26th

Ball-court further away from both playground and shelter

Noise and setbacks from homes has been considered, and appropriate setbacks from adjacent homes have been incorporated into the design. A minimum buffer of 30 metres has been implemented to reduce potential impacts from the court, including setbacks from the road to ensure player safety.

LAYOUT

I like the space between the features, although basketballs could hit people on the path without a fence on that side.

I like the fence around the basketball court. How far away is the tball court from the basketball court? will the balls potentially hit the basketball court? or is there a barrier (fence) around the basketball court there?)

I prefer that the basketball court is slightly further away from the playground. More natural/organic/fluid design.

I like that there is a separation between the multiple use court/ field and the children playground. If the walkway is used by bikes or running, perhaps have a small fence for the kids playground for safety so bikes or runners don't bump into kids. Water fountain is centrally located. I would love a basketball court with a comfortable playing surface and glass backboards (example: rally court at Barton and wentworth). The city should explore a partnership with the jays/raptors/leafs/tempo to team up as they have experience building these types of community projects. I love both designs but #2 has a beautiful flow. I hope there will be enough space so the softball players have a room in the outfield. I am excited to see this coming to life and using the park a lot more.

The court will include a 3m high chain-link fence. This fence is intended to prevent stray balls from leaving the court and to minimize potential conflicts with users of the adjacent pathway and nearby sun shelter, playground, t-ball and baseball diamonds.

The desire for glass (acrylic) backboards is understood although neighbourhood parks routinely use more robust components, such as metal backboards, to ensure longevity of the equipment.

ORIENTATION

I think that having the court parallel to the path would cause less danger as stray balls will be less likely to cross the path for families walking past. Court orientation and pathway considerations will be taken into account during detailed design however, the final orientation and entrance will





With the court being perpendicular I think more balls will be crossing into the path as that will be the direction of play. Basketball court not being parallel to walkway keeps balls from going in path of people. Multiuse Court should be oriented north to South to avoid any one team from being blinded by the sun. Swings and playground are together with parents of more than 1 kid means closer together

Play area not split by a path

Problems with #2: Swings on separate sides of the path from the playground will cause traffic issues for walkers/runners. The multi-use court would be too close to the t-ball in #2.

I like the flow more for concept 1. I like that the swings are located right beside the playground. It also seems like it allows more grass area between the ball court and the existing paved path. We're excited to see a new splash pad and playground.

The play areas are more closely consolidated, so it is easier to watch children in your care who may wish to play on different equipment at the same time.

I like that the play area is all in one area and not split between the walking path.

I like #1 because the swings and playground are not separated. It's easier for moms with more than one child to watch.

All park features and swings in one spot.

I like that the court is a bit closer to the park. That way I have a better visual of each my kids if they are at seperate features. Ex, one at the park and the other at the court

Concept 1 Leaves better spacing for T ball or other play use

I like that the playground and the swings are together so they are not separated by the walk way (compared to concept 2). This way, parents or guardians can keep an eye on their kids playing on the different equipment at once rather than on different sides.

I like that the swings and the play area are together.

All play equipment for children are in one area - parents can keep a close eye on children better that way. Children aren't running across park to swings.

Swings and playground right next to each other so kids can easily go back & forth and it's easy to watch/supervise them

I like the flow of concept one. Playground equipment is all together on one side of the path to avoid children from running back and forth getting in the way of bikers and pedestrians. Playground equipment is far enough from the baseball diamonds to avoid risk or injury from balls.

I choose concept 1 for a few reasons, specifically that concern me for concept 2. Concept 2 concerns: With a path dividing the swings and play ground there is a high chance of littler kids coliding with scooters and bikes on the path. Additionally with the path connecting to the longer side of the basketball court, playing equipment has a larger chance of colliding with scooters and bikes on the path.

I like Concept Design 1. I think keeping the playground and swings in one location is better than splitting with a sidewalk between them. For safety reasons, having the areas together keeps the kids from running back and forth crossing the sidewalk. With the new multi-use court added, people will park and walk down the sidewalk to the court. With kids running across the sidewalk, it could get congested.

I like that the swings are separate from the playground.

I like the court on the angle and the separation of the two play areas

I like them both. They each have redeeming qualities. I like #1 because the playground area is not divided by a pathway, it is more self contained. I think the playground space is too small. I like #2 because the fenced in multi use court is further away from the playground, and seeing as the little people will be at the playground and bigger people on the court, it might be in everyone's best interest to keep each in their own zone.

I like Concept 2's dynamic asphalt walkway - it makes it more interesting to walk down compared to Concept 1. I also like the separation of the playground and swing set in case older kids want to have a chat on the swings / their own space while the younger kids are at the playground. Either way, I am open to either Concepts and see pros in both designs.

Additionally having the swings and playground on the same side of the path may be easier to keep track of multiple kids if they want to do different things at the same time.

Site Furnishings Comments

TREES, SHADE, AND SUN SHELTER

Looks like the splash pad will have some shade!! Benches are needed!

I suggest adding more trees facing East 26th and between the multi-purpose court and the football area, as well as stone features (e.g. that can be used for sitting) and benches.

The sun shelter is old and used my homeless. Would be good to update that for a proper picnic area that can be used to eat. Plus used by baseball groups. The shelter now blocks view to baseball and really has limited use

The addition of trees will be considered as part of the overall design.

Trees will be located adjacent to key amenities including the playground, spray pad, multi-use sport court, picnic tables, and benches to provide shade and shelter. Open green space will be preserved for informal, unprogrammed play.

Additional shaded seating opportunities will be explored, subject to the overall project scope and available budget.

Preserving existing mature trees that are in good health remains a priority, and all reasonable efforts will be made to retain them.

Need shade.

SEATING

Both need more seating, both benches and picnic tables.

More benches in the area.

I would like more benches around the court and play area.

2 more benches around the playing space 2-3 picnic tables

More space for parking lots and picnic tables and benches for family to have fun eating lunches and snacks.

Lots of benches, and picnic tables would also be lovely!

More trees and benches.

LIGHTING

I think there should be at least a couple of more light posts along the existing civil path.

It would be helpful to have light poles along the Civil Existing Pathway from E. 26th Street to Upper Sherman Ave., with the light facing northside so as to not shine upon the backyards on the south side of the path. People walk their dogs along there all hours of the day, so having light at night would keep that whole park from being dark.

There is only 1 light pole in both designs - this park gets very dark at night especially in the winter. I'd like to propose adding more light poles along the walkways and around the spray pad area.

Suggestion: Please add more lighting in the park.

More lighting is great

Please put lights on the walking trails!!! It is so dark and dangerous walking through there at night and as a resident of the neighbourhood who walks my dog through the park regularly - this would make a huge difference.

A light standard is proposed adjacent to the playground to help deter unwanted behavior in the equipment and to improve visibility from the street.

All lighting-related feedback will be considered for future planning and development of the park however, pathway lighting is not included in the current project scope.

CONCEPT LAYOUTS

Make pathways more curved as in Concept 1 (more interesting)

I have attempted to participate in the Eastmount Park Engagement Opportunity/Survey. Unfortunately, the survey appears to force taxpayers into accepting one or the other concepts put forward. It does not allow for my honest response - preference for neither concept 1 or concept 2.

My preference, despite the need for additional recreation facilities, is to preserve what little greenspace we have in Hamilton. As a taxpayer, I support the city creating new recreational parks, but not at the expense of developing existing greenspace.

NORTH-SOUTH PATHWAY

Can the dirt path be made into an asphalt path?

Seems like a good use of space,. Can the dirt path be paved instead of dirt? Hospital workers and park goers walk this path quite heavily and I'm not sure how a dirt path would hold up.

There is no need for a diagonal paved path connecting the corner of the park to the multiuse court and the parking lot as drawn in both conceptual plans. What there is a need for, however, is a dry, snow-cleared path in the location marked as "Dirt Path" on the plans, which connects a walking trail from E27th street north-south through the park. The current dirt path is often flooded, muddy or covered in snow.

Both designs should consider adding an additional path from the south eastern corner, as a desire path is likely to occur from this direction is the parking lot remains as is.

Keeping the pad/playground/court as compact as possible allows for more use of the other grass area for unplanned uses.

Why do both designs have the path cutting across the middle of the grass area to connect the existing asphalt to the new features? This seems like a misuse of space, that restricts the ability for kids, dogs, etc. to use the grassy areas. Reroute

the N-S section of the asphalt pathway closer to E26th or closer to the existing dirt pathway (or best of all, simply replace the dirt pathway with the asphalt pathway, since many hospital workers seem to use this as part of their pedestrian commuting route.)

I would also like to see a pathway run northsouth (doesn't have to be paved, even slightly wider gravel one) since people walk there anyway, but to cut down on the mud.

It would be nice to have a new sidewalk in place of the dirt path from the end of E. 27th St. across the field where the current T-Ball play area is and join up with the new sidewalk (the Civil Existing Pathway). You can tell by foot traffic that people walk from Queensdale Ave. E. to the bottom of E. 27th St.

Additionally, I'm disappointed to see that the dirt path is not being paved, particularly since it's even identified on these plans as a path. It makes the park look junky and also means it won't get plowed in the wintertime. It also gets extremely muddy and impassible during the springtime and other wet periods. Almost every other park in the area has a paved trail that connects end to end and this should be no different. Excited to see Eastmount redone!

I'm disappointed that the city has not considered upgrading the "Dirt Path" that connects East 27th street north-to-south through the park.

I walk in this park almost every day and when I do, I often see people crossing the park north-south through mud, slush, and soggy grass. The proposed designs have a diagonal path that would connect the southwest corner of the park to the parking lot and spray pad. This path is not necessary as it duplicates the access provided by the sidewalk on the west side of the park. The north-south path made of dirt is the barrier to accessibility and the nuisance to park users that the city should really be addressing.

INTERNAL PERIMETER PATHWAY

Please also add a running path around the baseball diamonds as mentioned by Esther Paul's at previous engagements.

Concept 2 seems like it will allow for more people using the park at once. The only thing I would like to suggest is that there's a circular pathway around the park so people can walk with their newborns away from busy roads, and people can do their runs safely without being near the busy roads. I believe they have done something similar at Eleanor park and Inch park

However there should be a paved path all the way around the back of the diamonds that then cuts through where the "dirt path" is right now, to tie back into the existing paved path, so we have an actual loop.

A perimeter walking loop cannot be accommodated within the scope of this current project. The request has been noted and can be considered in future park redevelopment initiatives.

PARKING

You need more Parking which is completely missing from this proposal. This parking lot is already too small and the residents of East 26th can barely park or get in and out of driveways when there is baseball as it is. Making this park better will mean more traffic which will require more parking to be available.

Concept 1 looks good, no additional comments - except we need more parking for cars. The residents of East 26th are very frustrated with the blocking of our driveways, parking in front of fire hydrants, traffic when coming home from work. This is only a problem when t-ball and baseball little league is on. Please somehow expand the parking.

It is understood that during the summer months, this area experiences high parking demand due to the popularity of the spray pad and baseball fields. There are time-limited and permit-only parking restrictions currently in place in the area. It is the responsibility of park users to locate appropriate legal street parking, which may require parking farther away and walking a short distance to access the site.

The proposed works primarily involve the replacement of existing amenities. The addition of the new multi-use court is intended for unprogrammed, neighbourhood-level use and is





I think it would make sense to have a small parking log along E. 26th St. for those using the multi-use court because the Eastmount Community Centre parking lot gets full, as well as cars parking along the street.

Also, street parking on East 26th is very cumbersome during baseball season. Can a larger parking area or areas be developed in the future?

DOG PARK

The number of off-leash dogs running through the park needs to be eliminated. Dog owners take advantage of the wide open spaces and play fetch etc with their dogs off-leash. Less wide-open spaces would hopefully discourage off-leash dog use. (Stricter by-laws and heftier fines would maybe help if by-law officers actually enforced the park by-laws).

I have a dog and we like to walk through the park and go on the playground (only when there are no kids around) for training and exposure. As mentioned, a fenced leash-free area for dogs would be ideal to open this park not only to families and children, but to pet owners as well.

Every effort is made to prioritize native tree species in alignment with the Hamilton Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP). Trees selected for planting in parks are consistent with the City's Approved Tree Species for Parks and Open Spaces, which considers factors such as hardiness, species diversity, and cultural suitability.

Additional habitat and natural food sources for wildlife, such as fruiting trees, pollinator gardens, or meadows, are not included within the scope or budget of this project.

Community gardens will not be incorporated as part of the current redevelopment.

The City's *Public Art Master Plan (2026-2036)* will guide future decisions related to the inclusion of public art in community spaces. At this time, public art is not being considered as part of the proposed improvements at Eastmount Park.
