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Introduction

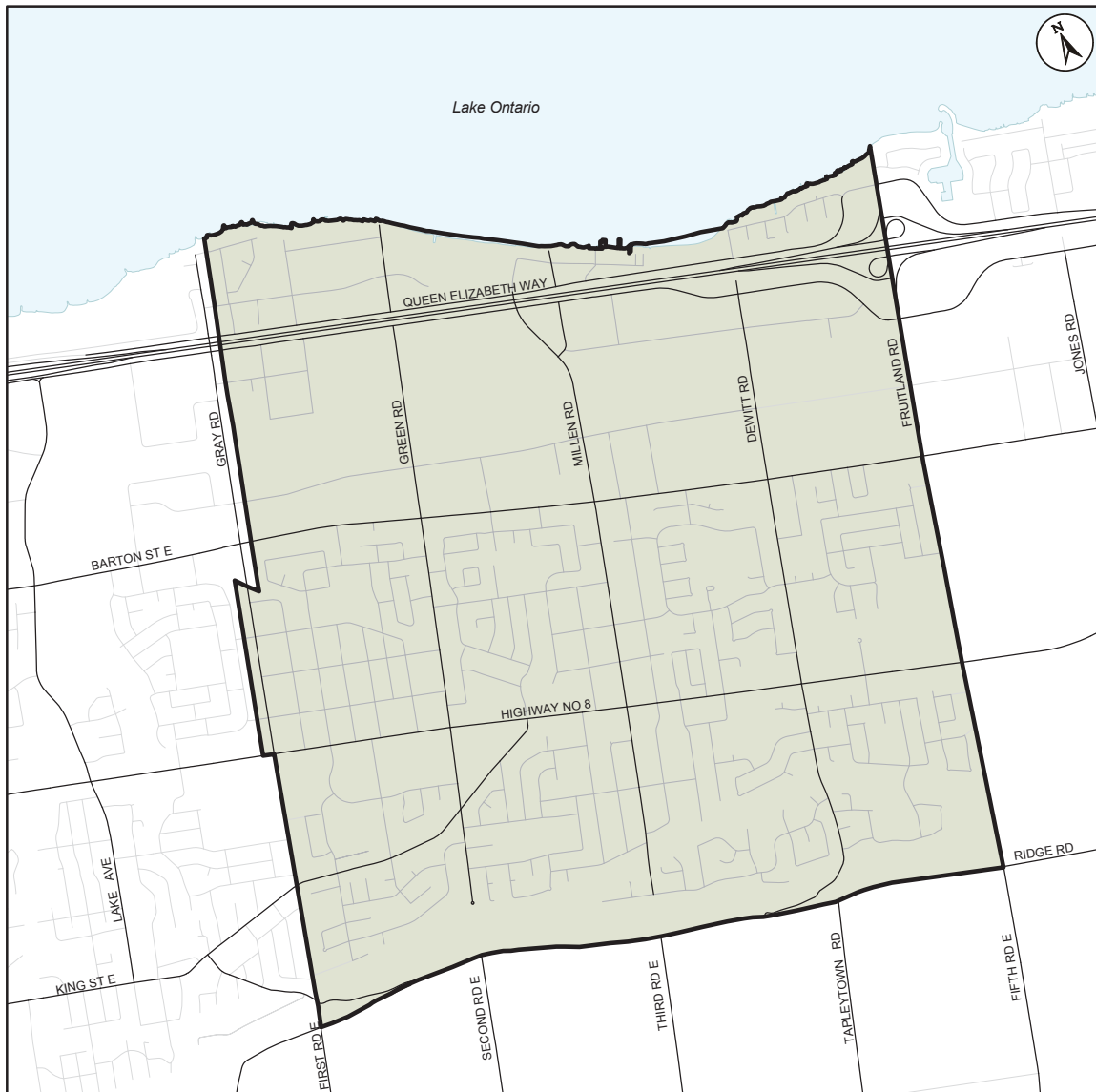
This document is one in a series of 15 Ward Profiles developed for the City of Hamilton. Each ward profile provides an overview of the ward's features, assets and various indicators of socio-demographic characteristics.

The indicators in each of the Ward Profiles are a compilation of the most recent available data from Statistics Canada's 2011 Census, Statistics Canada's 2011 National Household Survey, the City of Hamilton's Planning and Economic Development Department (PED) development applications, Planning and Economic Development Department (PED) building permits, Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) housing starts, orthophotos, Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC), Teranet, and the Official Plan and Parks Committee. Note that due to the various sources of data used in this document, there may be discrepancies between data that may result from differences in definitions of variables and/or geographic boundaries between data sources. Moreover, considerations should also be taken of the 2011 National Household Survey limitations provided at the end of this document when reviewing this data.

Where available, data for different points in time and/or for the overall City of Hamilton was also provided. Each indicator is presented in tables and graphs which help draw comparisons over time and between geographies.

Ward 10, also known as the Stoney Creek area is an urban ward situated below the Niagara Escarpment (often referred to as the Mountain), with an industrial and commercial corridor south of the Queen Elizabeth Way. It is bordered by the lower edge of the Escarpment to the south, Lake Ontario to the north, Fruitland Road to the east and Grays Road to the west. Ward 10 is home to Mohawk College STARRT Institute and a section of the Hamilton Waterfront Trail. Ward 10 is located within the Hamilton Conservation Authority watershed.



Population

Population by Age

- Ward 10 has 24,275 residents which is 4.7% of the city's total population.
- Compared to Hamilton, the proportion of population below 50 years of age is slightly lower in Ward 10, but the age groups above 49 years of age are all slightly higher in total population.

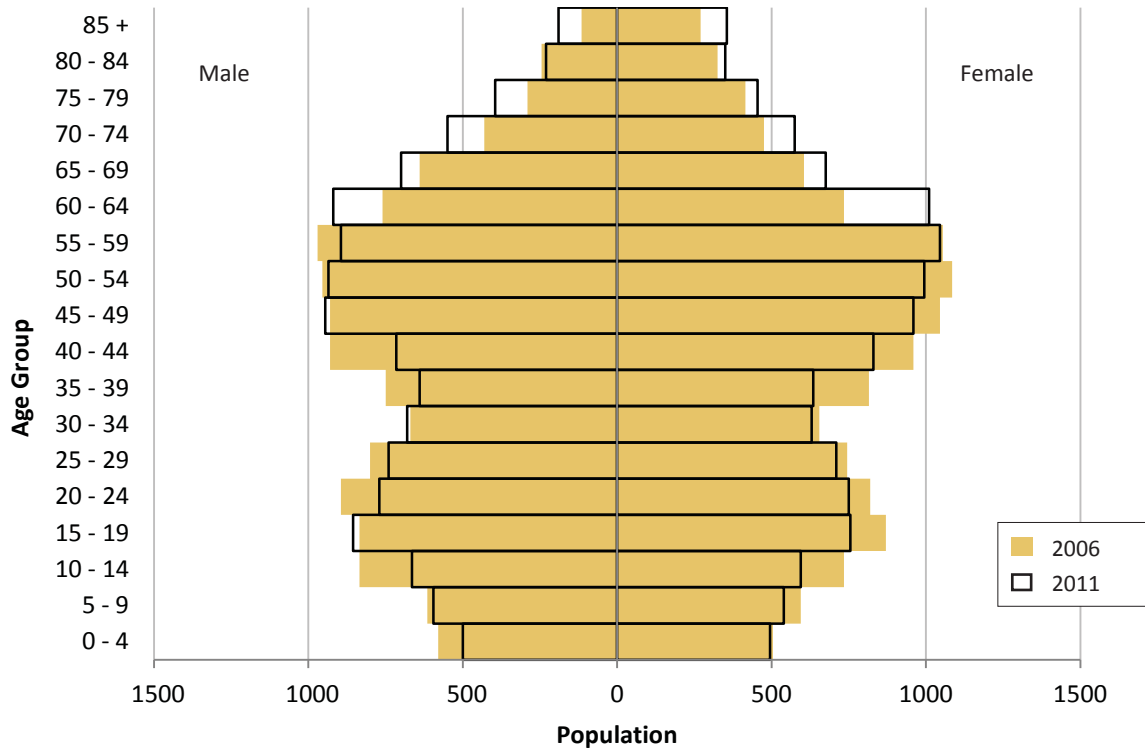

Population by Sex and Age Group, Ward 10, 2006 and 2011 Census



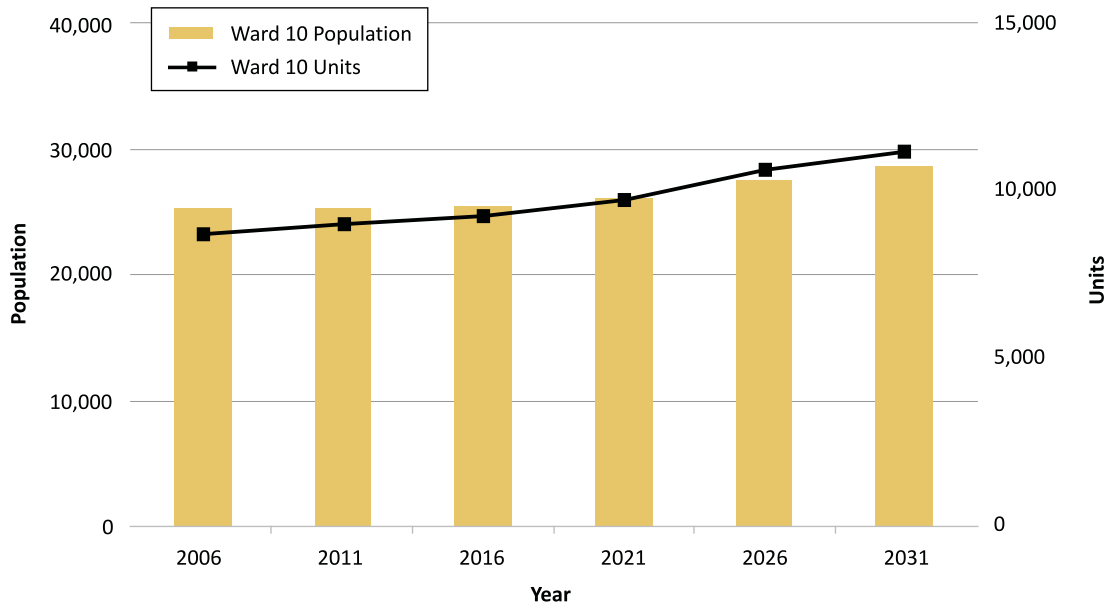
Population Projections

- The 2011 year end population for Ward 10 is expected to increase approximately 13% by 2031 according to the land use population model based on the GRIDS growth projections.
- Projected units are to increase by 22% to 11,155 for an average persons per unit of 2.56 in 2031.

25 Year GRIDS Population Projections - Ward 10



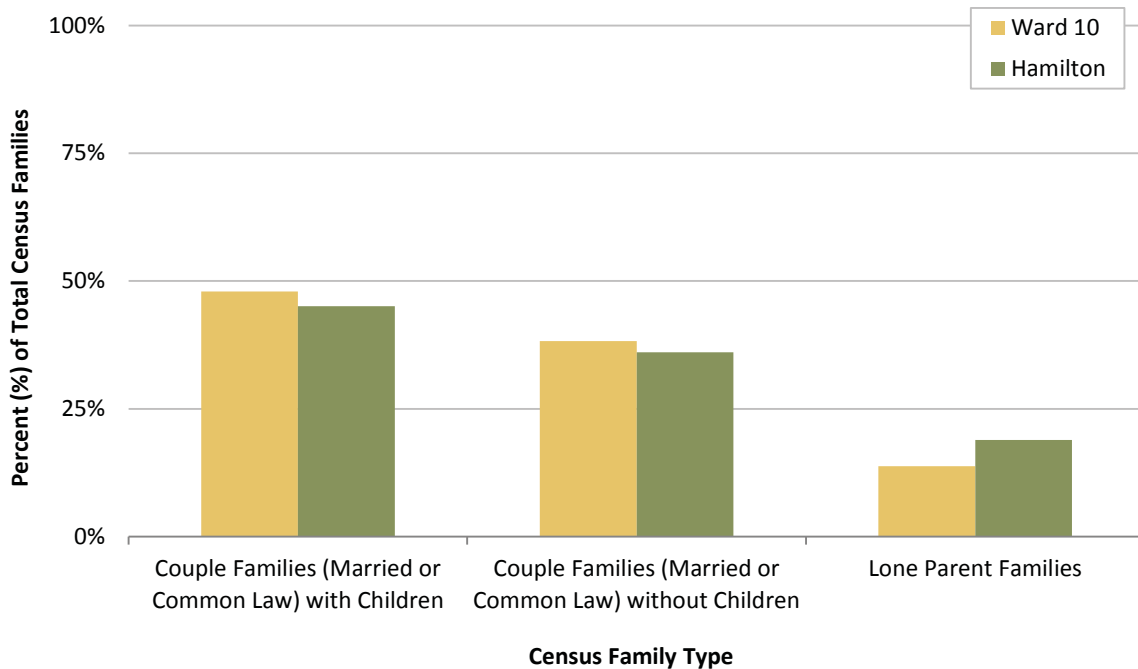
Family Structure

Family Structure of Census Families



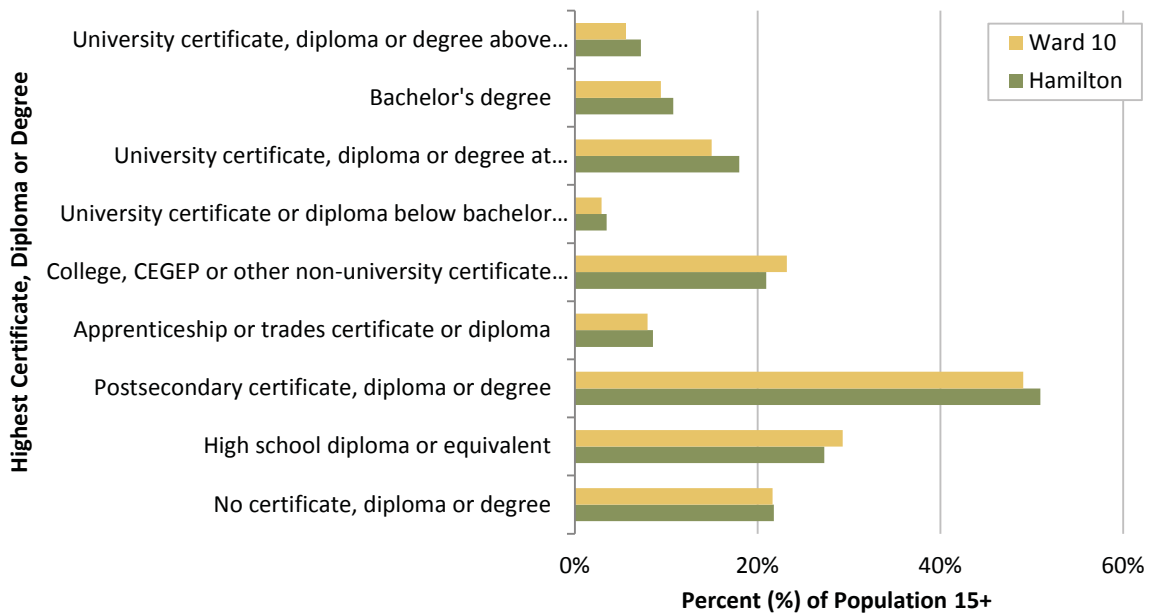

Highest Education Certificate, Diploma or Degree - 2011



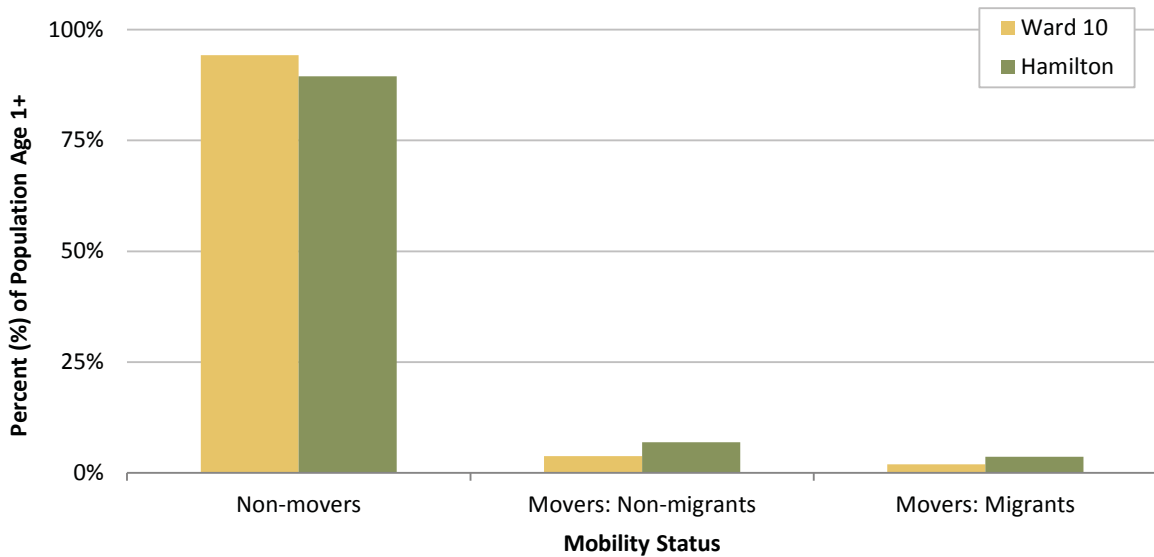

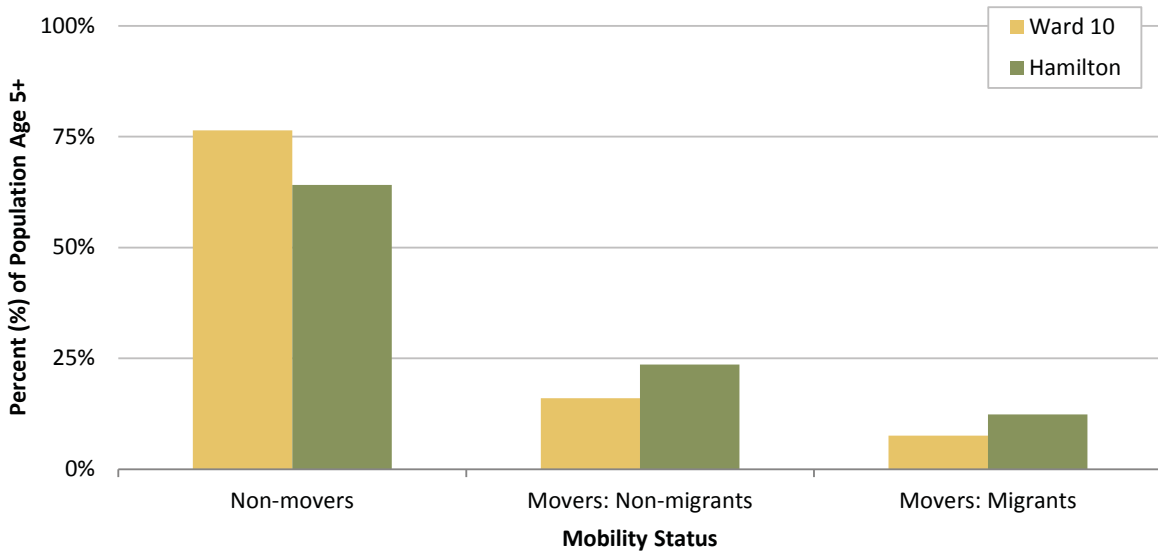
Mobility Status 1 Year Ago - 2011

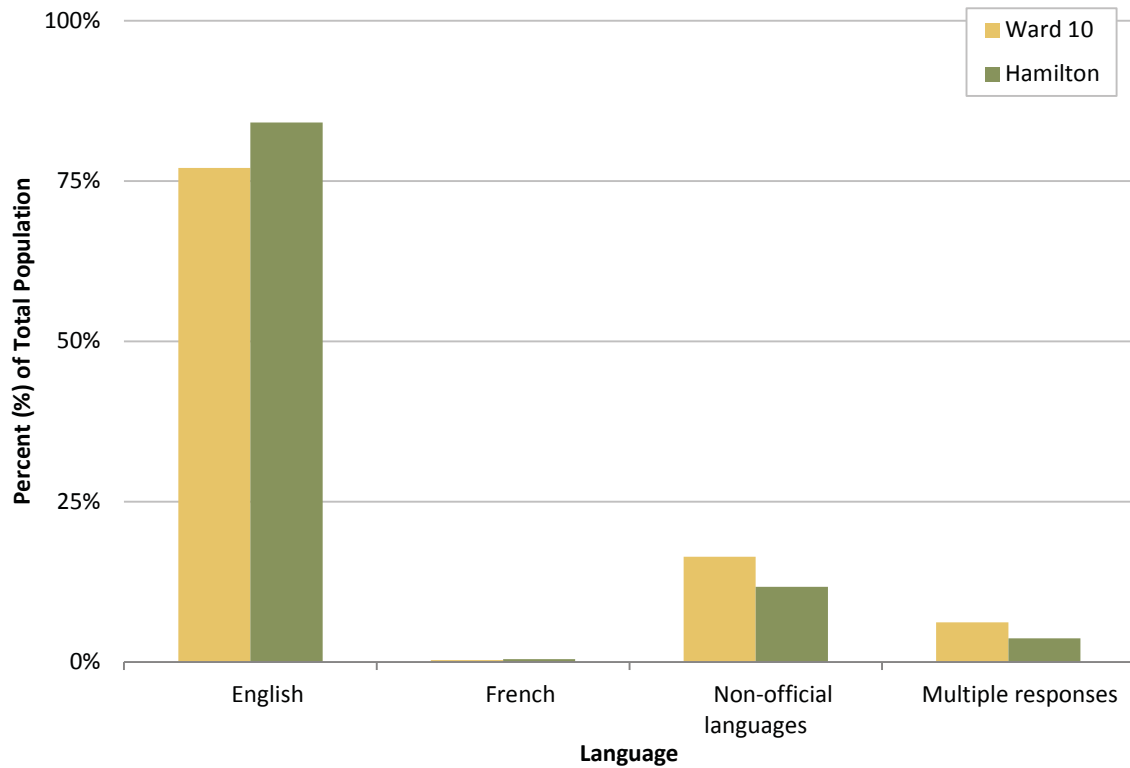

Language Most Often Spoken at Home - 2011



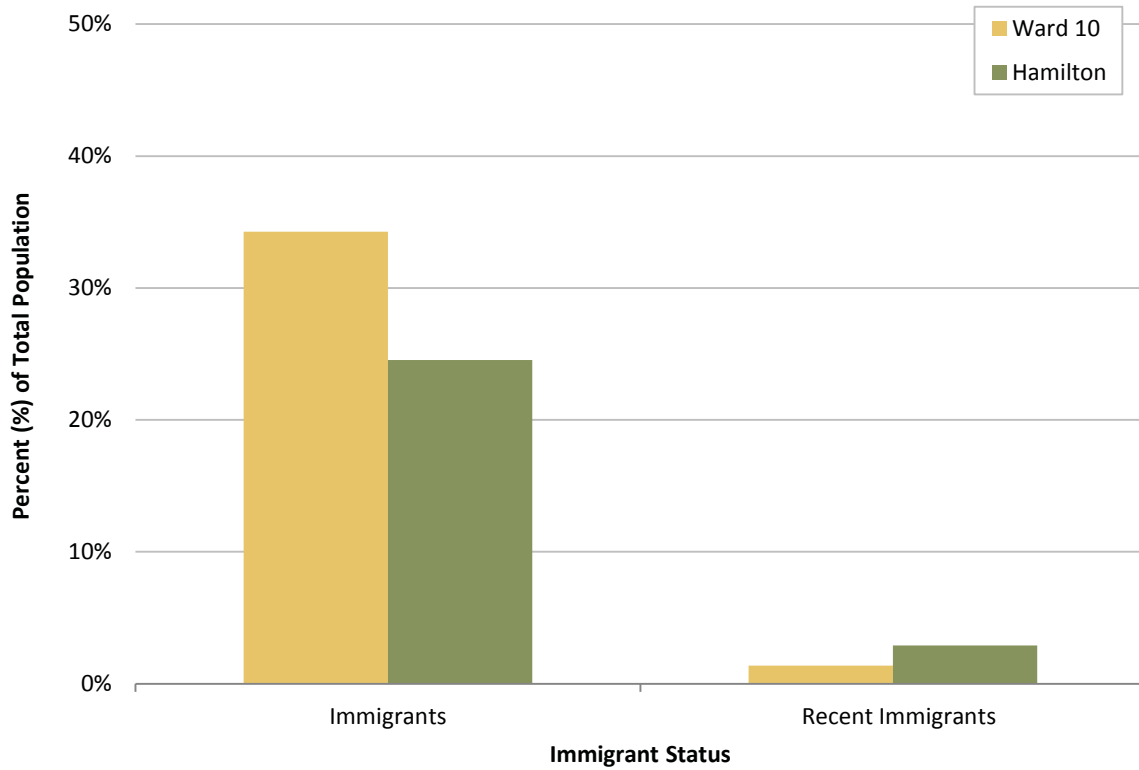

Immigrants - 2011



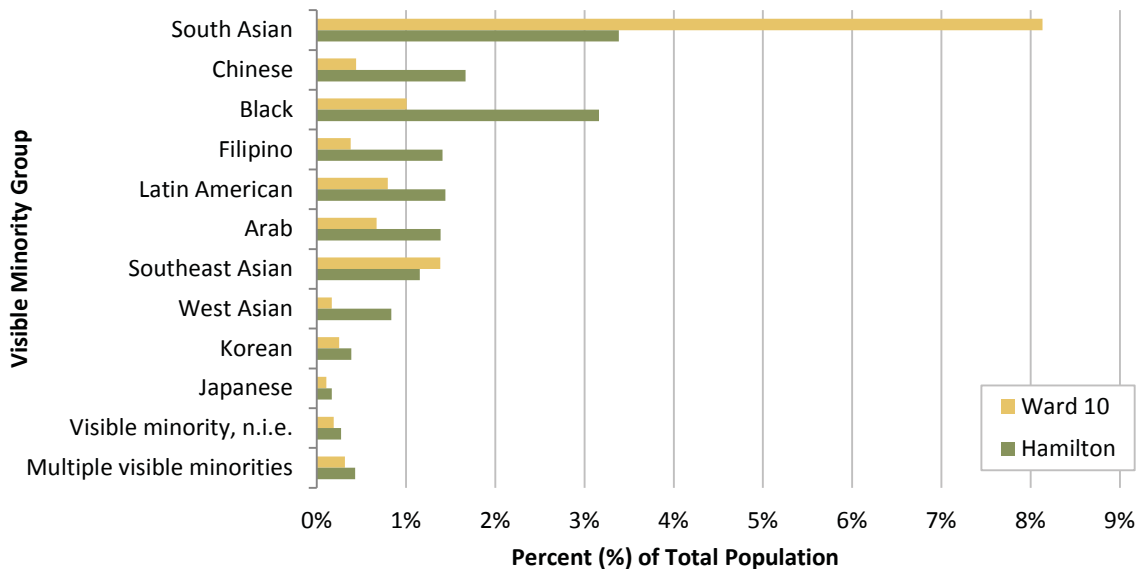

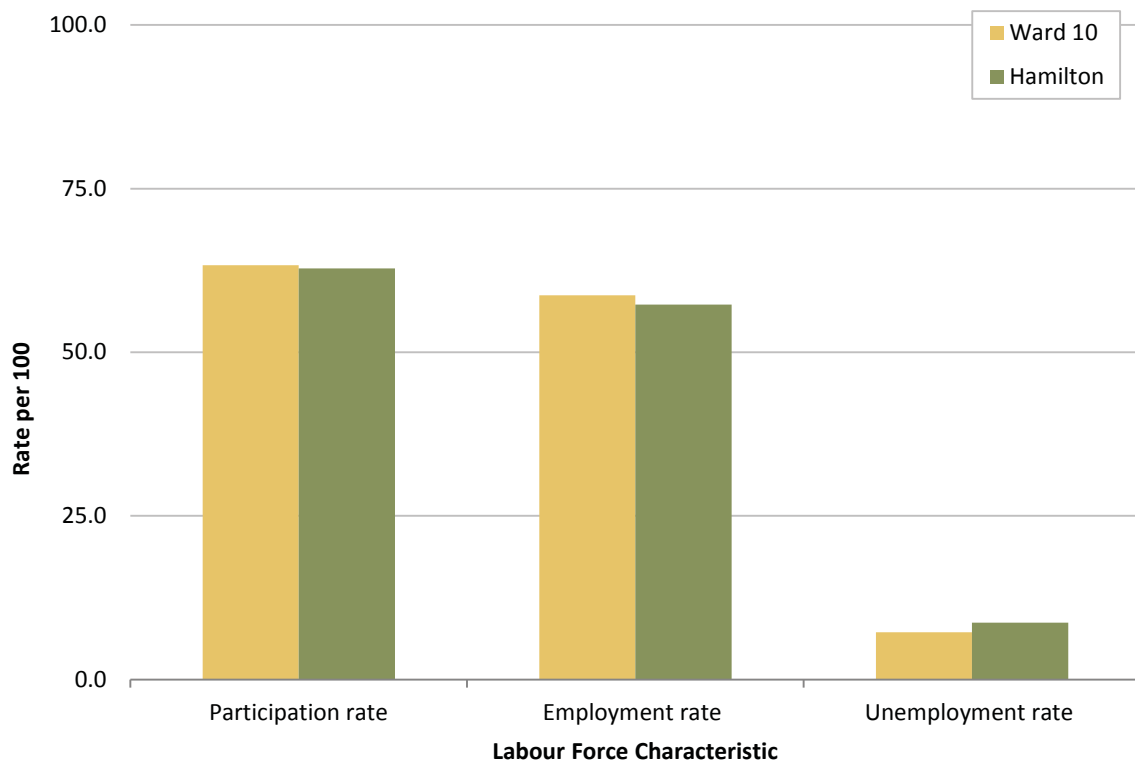

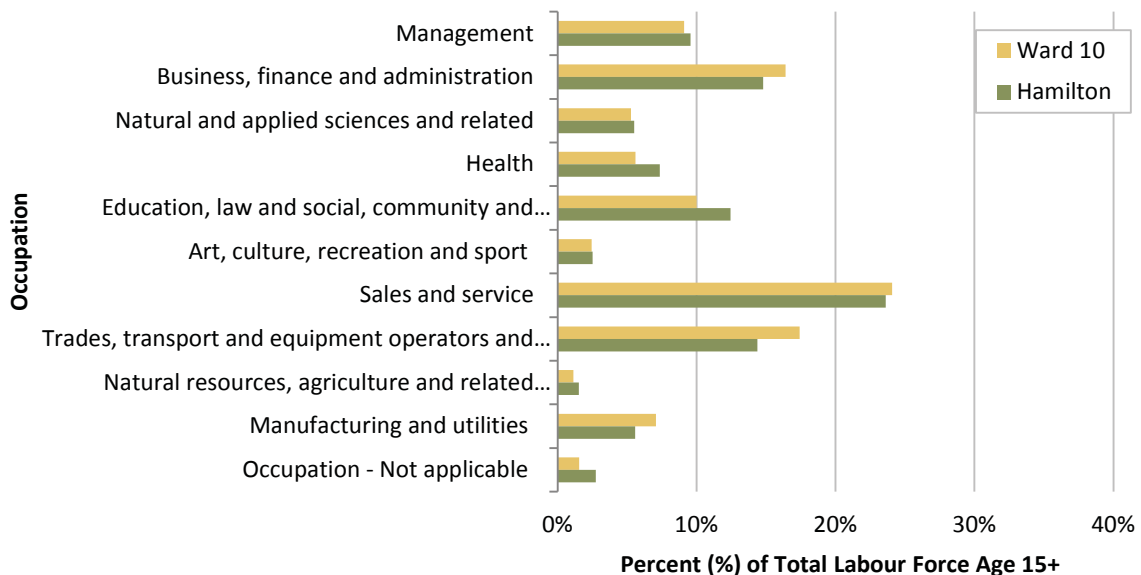

Labour Force by Occupation - 2011



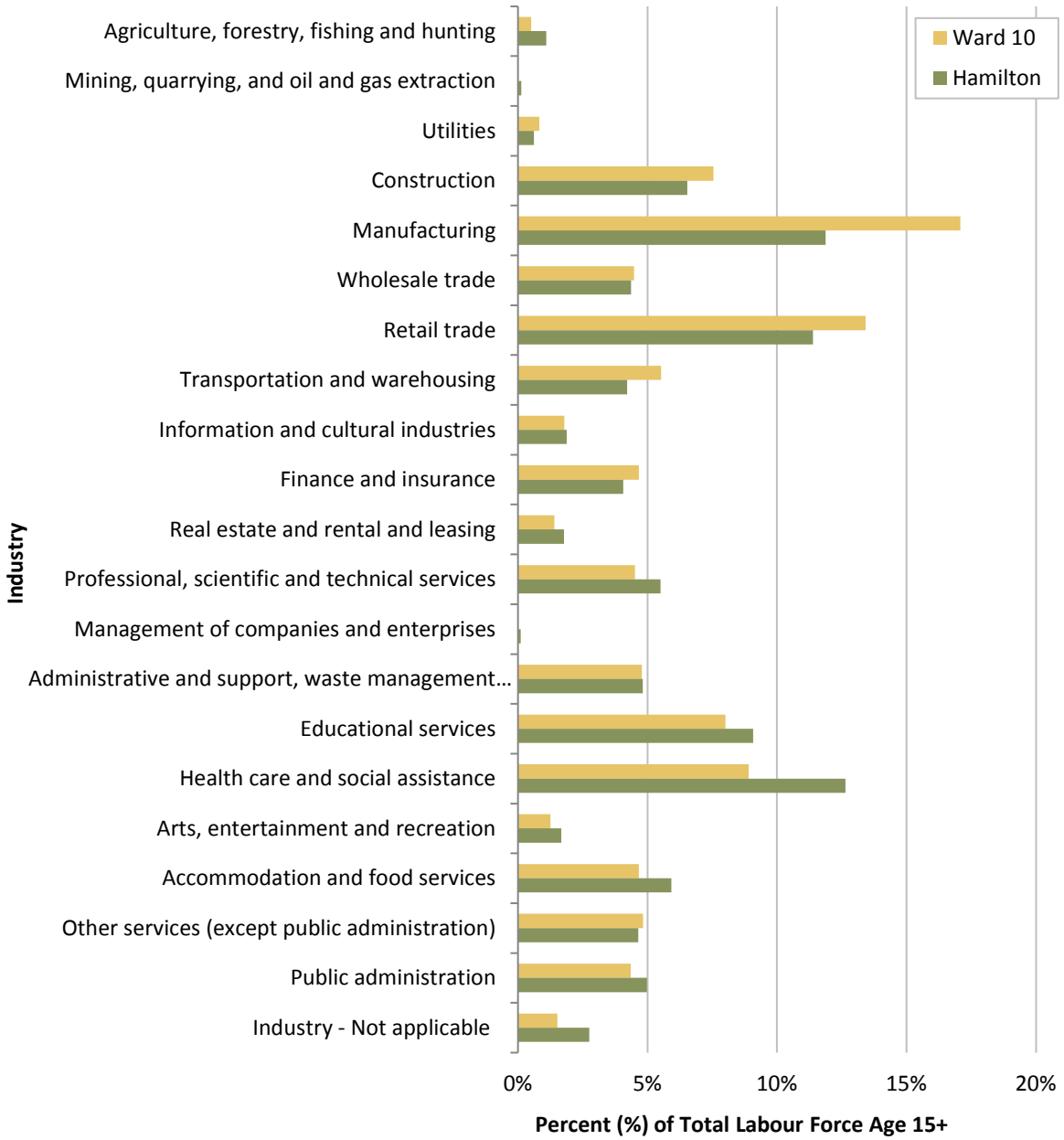

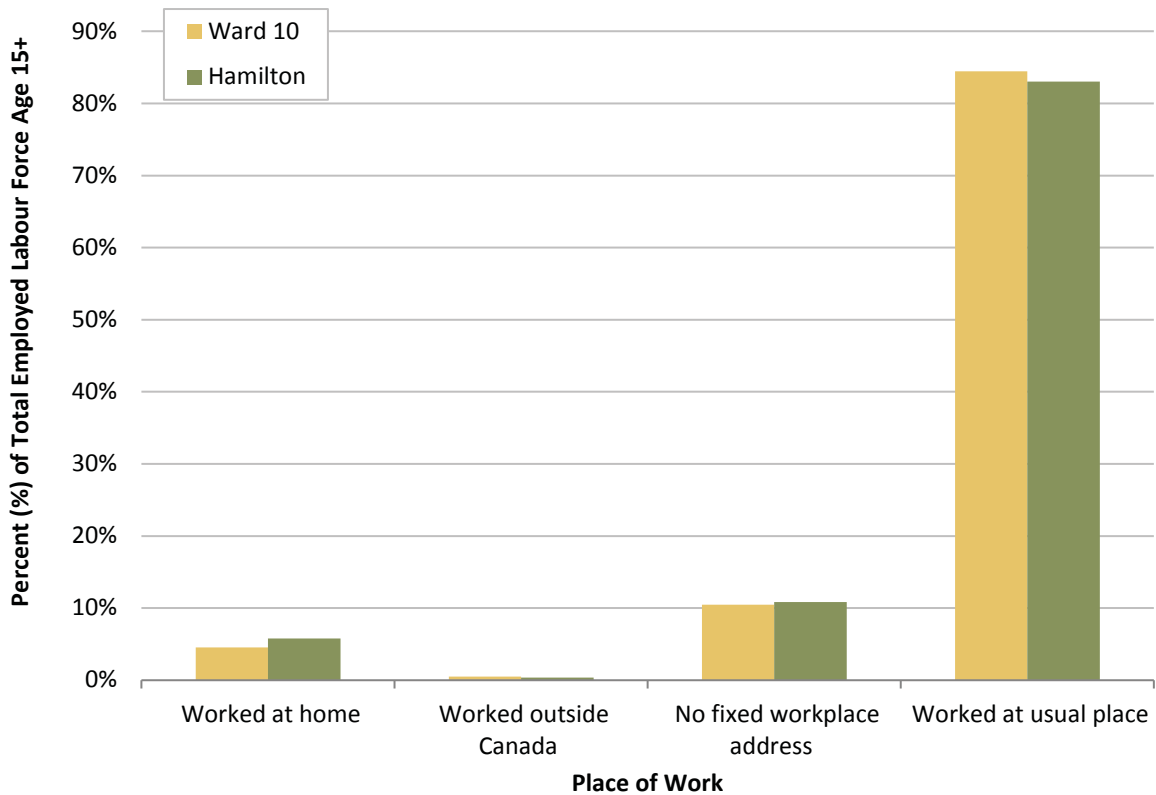

Employed Labour Force by Place of Work 2011



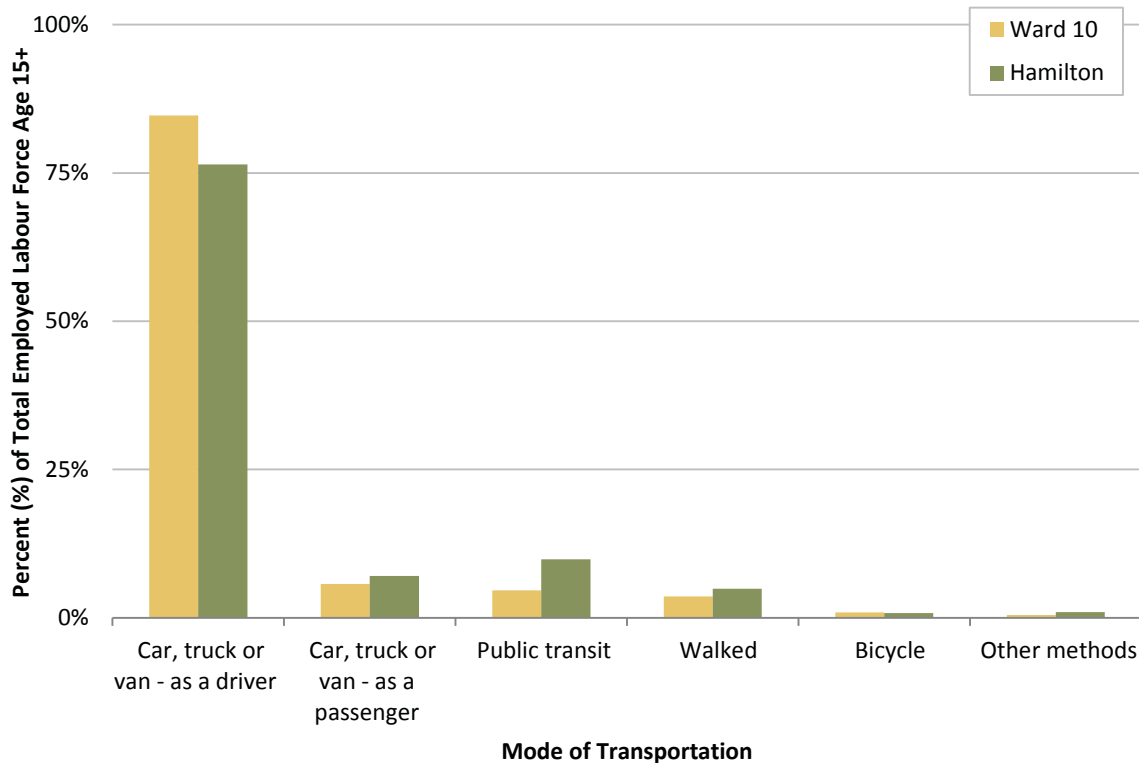
Mode of Transportation

Employed Labour Force by Mode of Transportation - 2011



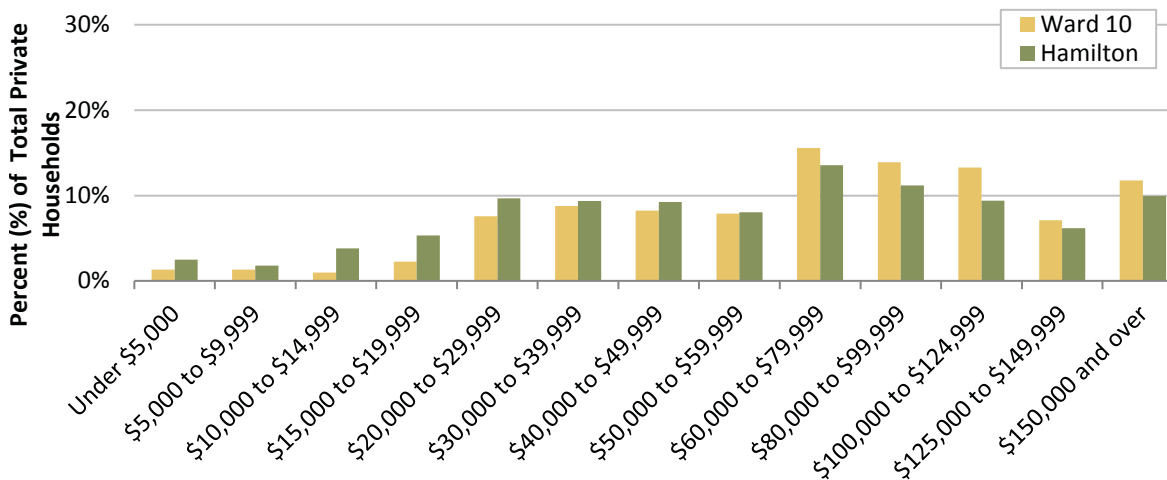

Household Income - 2010



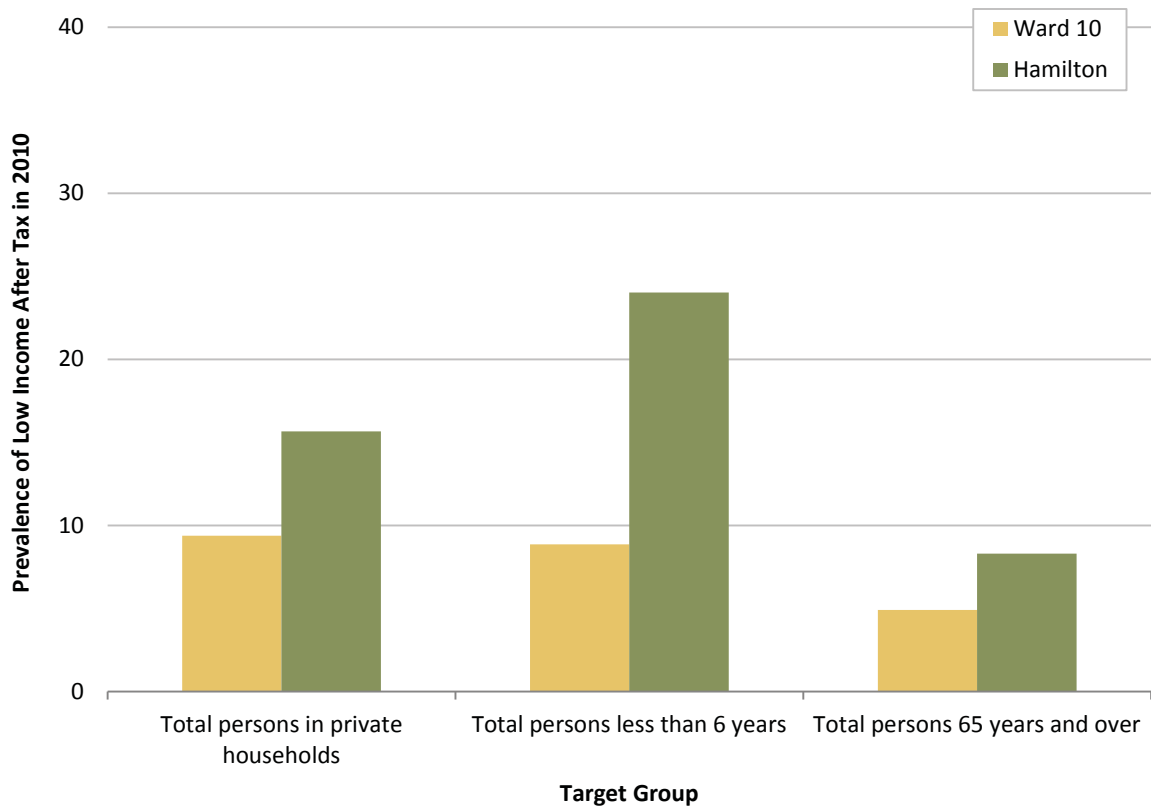

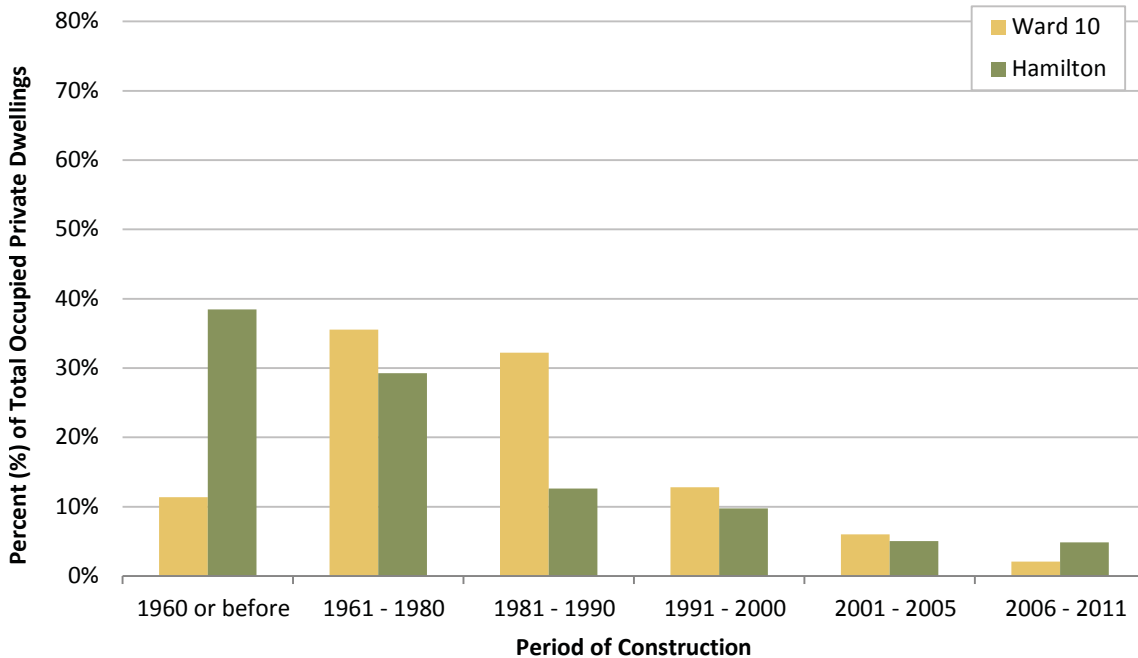

Occupied Private Dwellings by Period of Construction - 2011



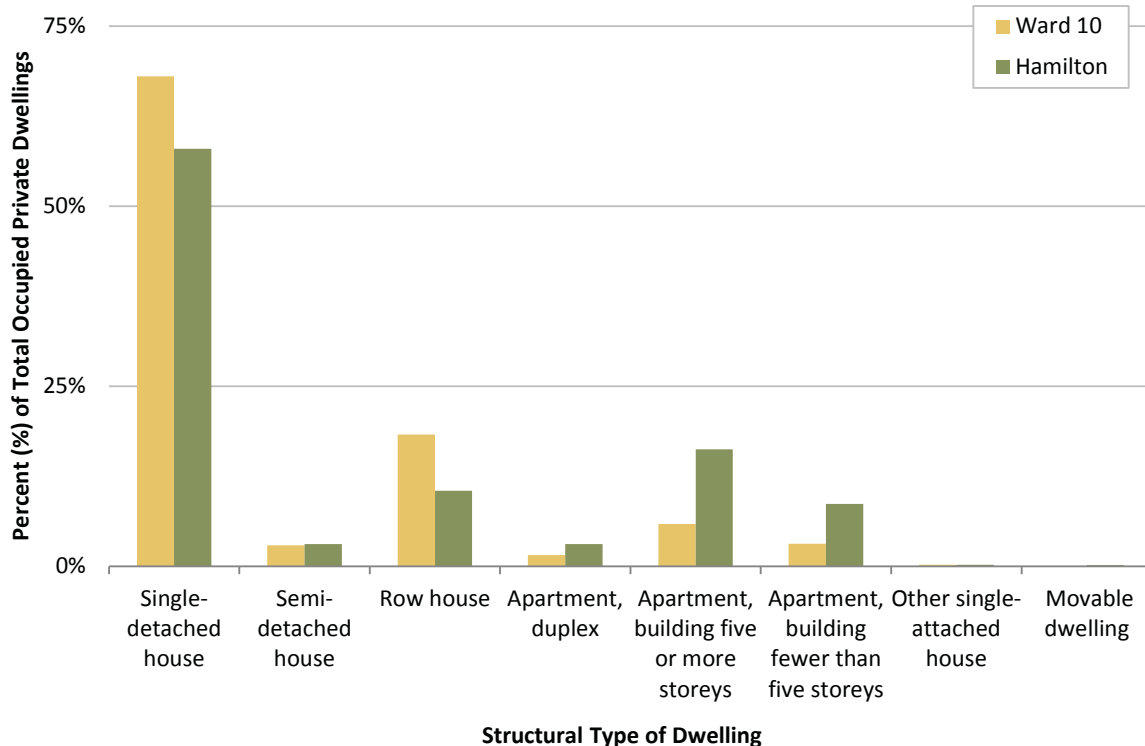

Vacant Residential Land Inventory

- Although most of the area is developed there is 12.7 hectares of potential vacant residential land available for an estimated 547 dwelling units.
- The majority of these, namely 69% or 378 units are in draft approved status, while the remaining, or 30% or 163 units are under potential development status.
- Most of the dwelling types for proposed development in Ward 10 are either townhouses, (38%) or apartment units (48%), while single family comprises only 14%.

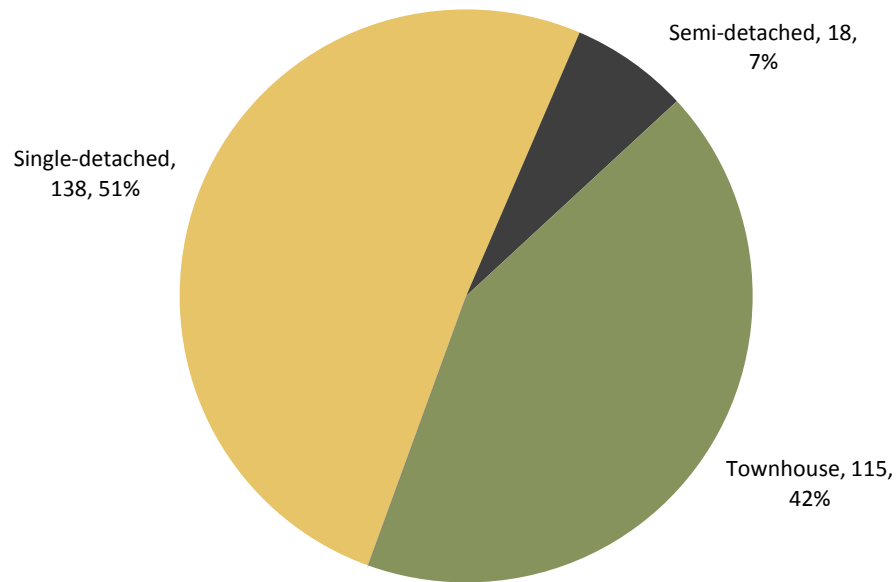
Housing Starts

- In the thirteen year period since 2000, there were a total of 805 housing starts reported by Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) for Ward 10, of which 47% were single detached, while 43% were townhouse units.
- There has been a steady decline in new housing starts in Ward 10 since the mid-2000s, with less than 20 new units being reported annually for the last three years.

Housing Starts - Ward 10, 2006-2013



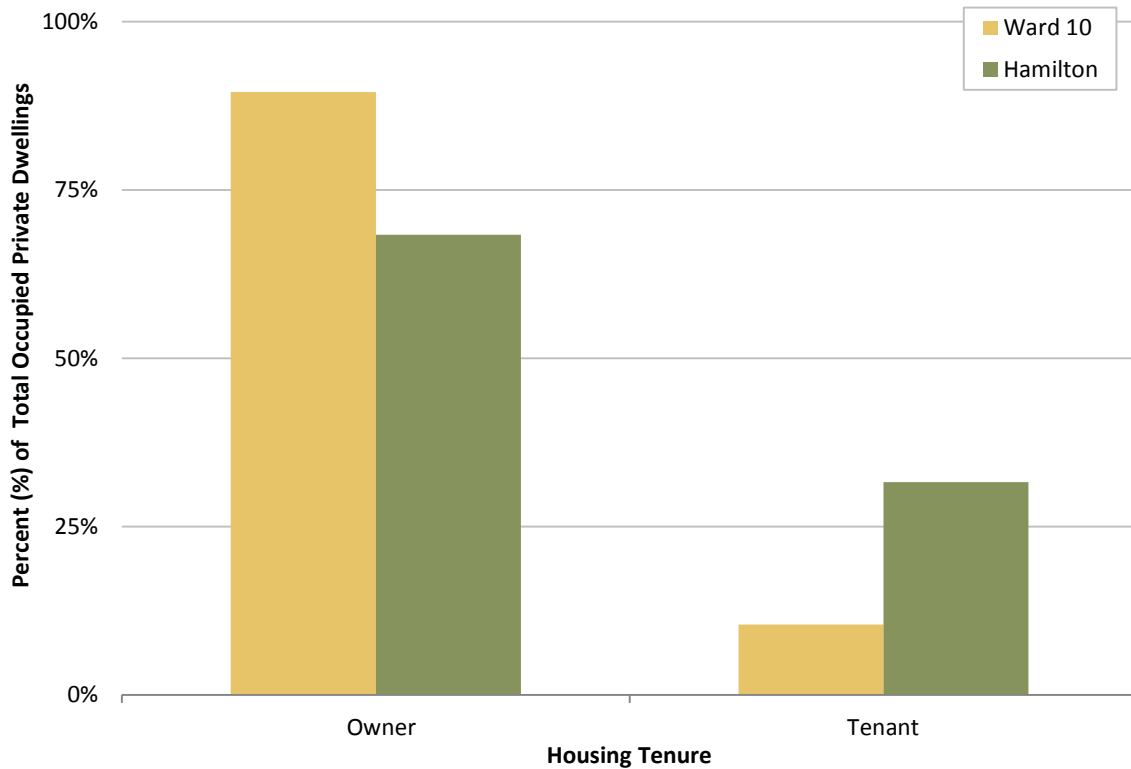

Housing Tenure - 2011



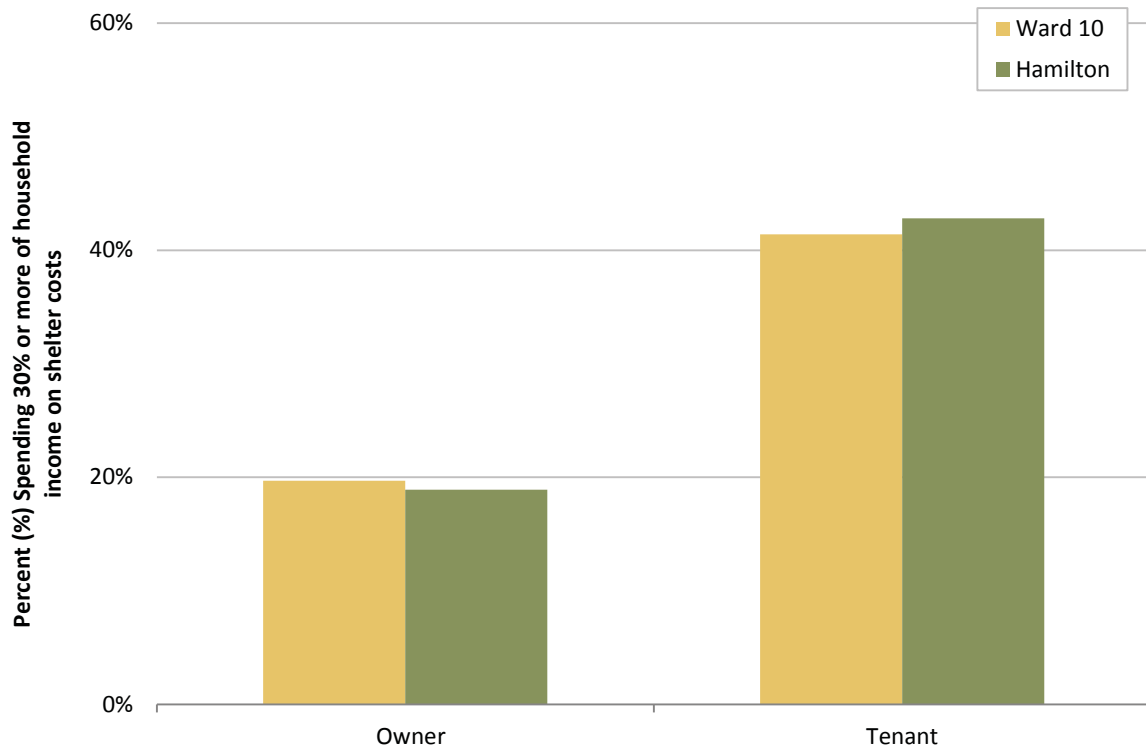

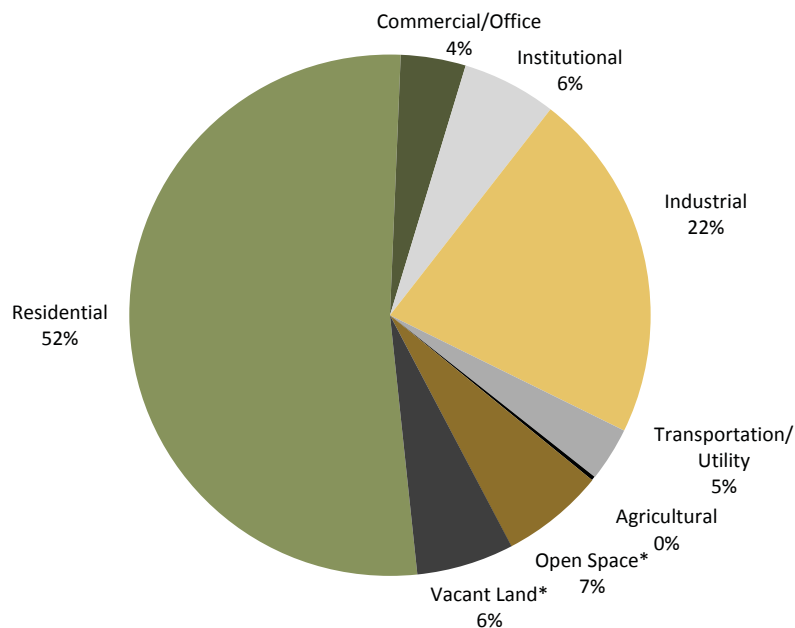
Primary Land Use

- More than half (52%) of ward 10 is comprised of residential land use, totalling 1,249 acres.
- Ward 10 is located in the community of Stoney Creek and within the urban boundary. Next to Ward 2, Ward 10 is the second smallest in the city, only totalling approximately 2,400 acres in size.
- The industrial portion is still proportionately large at 519 acres or 22% of the total land use. The remaining land uses only make up less than 10% in each category.
- The estimated Ward 10 density is estimated at 48.0 persons per net residential hectare on residential lands, or 19.6 persons per gross hectare of the overall ward.

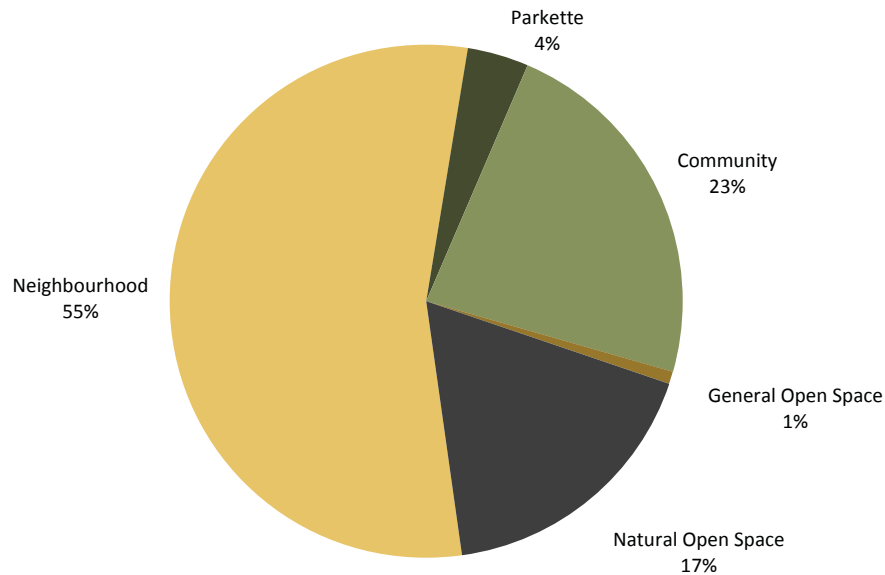
Parks and Open Space

- In 2014, Ward 10 had a surplus of 11.4 hectares in neighbourhood parks and deficit of 5.1 hectares for community parks.
- The percentage of neighbourhood parks is among the highest in the city at 55%, or 28.4 hectares, followed by Community parks (23%) and Natural Open Space (17%).
- There are no city wide parks in this ward. Sherwood Park is the largest classified park (Community) in Ward 10 at 7.6 hectares.

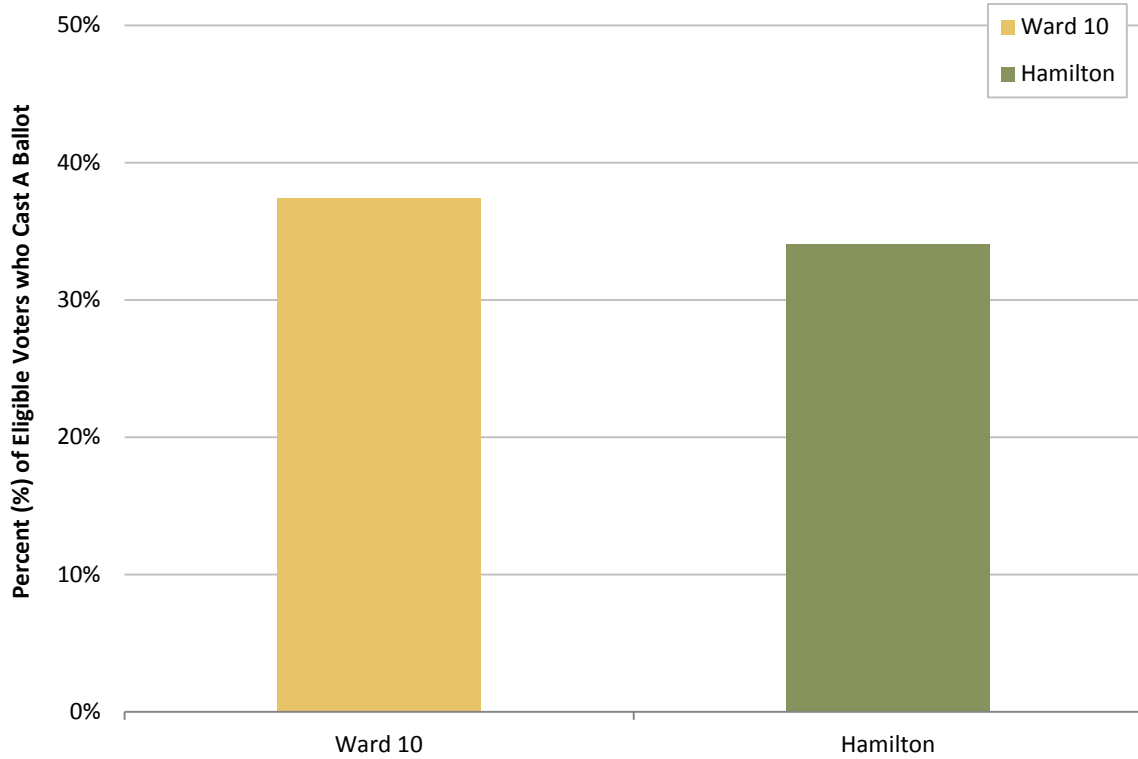

2011 National Household Survey

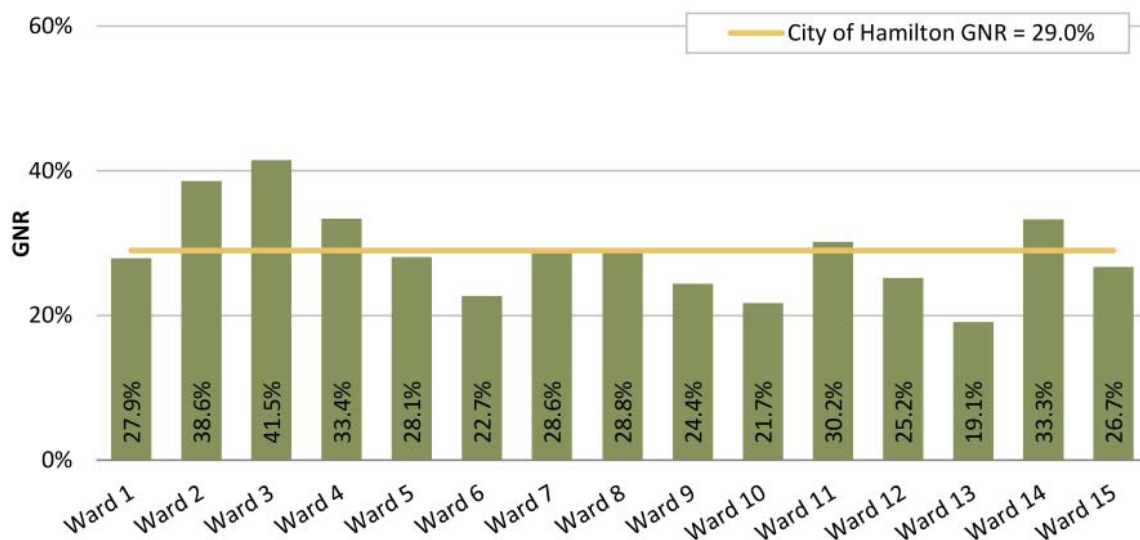
Limitation Notes

The 2011 National Household Survey (NHS) provides information about the demographic, social and economic characteristics of Canadians. The NHS was designed to capture the socio-demographic characteristics that were previously collected by the long form census questionnaire. However, the NHS had made some changes to the census questions and is a voluntary survey which would result in estimates subject to higher non-response bias than the previous mandatory long form census.

Non-response bias is a concern because populations who choose to respond to a survey tend to be different from those who chose not to participate in a survey. This means there would be data gaps for certain groups that tend not to participate in voluntary surveys (including aboriginal, low income, immigrants and other groups) and data may be skewed to over or under represent different sub-population groups. For the 2011 National Household Survey (NHS) estimates, the global non-response rate (GNR) is used as an indicator of data quality. This indicator combines complete non-response (household) and partial non-response (question) into a single rate. A smaller GNR indicates a lower risk of non-response bias and as a result, lower risk of inaccuracy.

Despite then the fact that the questions in the NHS were similar to those from the previous mandatory long form census questionnaire, due to methodological differences between the NHS and the census, comparisons of data from these two sources are unreliable. Hence, the 2011 NHS data should not be compared to previous Census data and trend over time information is not available for the information that used to be collected in the census long-form questionnaire.

Furthermore, since it is not possible to determine with certainty whether differences in data are attributable to actual differences of a characteristic among populations or non-response bias, extra caution should be exercised when comparing NHS data for different and/or at smaller geographies with varying Global Non-Response Rates (GNRs). Comparisons between geographies with similar GNRs may be more suitable. The following table shows the GNRs of each ward in the City of Hamilton as well as the overall GNR for the City of Hamilton. Note that the GNRs vary greatly between the different wards ranging from 19.1% to as high as 41.5%; with most being over 25% which is the 2011 Census threshold for suppression.



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
